trash service

Stevens Disposal is the company Frenchtown Charter Township has contracted with to provide rubbish and yard waste collection services. Each Stevens trash cart has a serial number linked with the parcel address and is the property of Stevens Disposal. These carts are meant to stay with the property to which they were distributed and are not to be removed from the premises. Missing carts are the financial responsibility of the homeowner and will not be replaced without a police report. Each address is allotted one cart. Additional carts may be rented annually through Stevens Disposal **1 (800) 779-0344**.

- Please set trash carts out the night before your scheduled pick-up day.
- Please remove carts from the road's edge once they are emptied. This will help avoid possible theft, damage to the carts and it will give the streets a clean appearance.
- Remember to place the trash carts three (3) feet off the road and not on the paved shoulder. Where there is a white pavement marking, carts need to be placed three (3) feet in from the end of the driveway.
- The BROWN former Republic carts are to be used for garbage only and the BLUE former Republic carts can be used for yard waste and will not be emptied if filled with trash.

bulk items

If you have large items that do not fit in your container, we need a minimum of 24 hours' notice to schedule a bulk pick up. Please be mindful of township holidays that fall before a bulk pickup day as this may affect the schedule. You may contact Lisa at (734) 242-3282, ext.3 to arrange for the collection of bulk items.

Refrigerators, freezers, air conditioning units and dehumidifiers must have freon removed and certi fied tagged by HVAC company.

Prohibited items:

Yard waste, concrete, brick, blocks, asphalt, dirt and stone, tires, wheels, brake rotors and drums, metal, or steel automotive parts (including seats), oils, stain, and solvents (considered hazardous waste), and no propane or helium tanks/cylinders.

YARD WASTE COLLECTION WILL END November 30, 2023.

- Yard waste should be placed curbside, apart from your household trash, the night before your scheduled trash service day.
- Blue Carts with Yard Waste Only stickers, smaller old style garbage cans with Yard Waste Only stickers and leaf bags are all able to be used for Yard Waste pick-up when it starts in the spring.

HOLIDAY SCHEDULE:

Trash pickup for the remainder of 2023 will run one day late following: Thanksgiving, Chrismas and New Year's Day

- A private road is defined as a road that has not been certified and maintained by the County or the State.
- All signage, pavement marking and maintenance on private roads are the responsibility of the adjacent Property Owners or a Property Owners Association.
- The Township cannot lawfully expend public sums on improvements to private roads.

- Location (address or corner streets): an address is needed to report. Pole # if available.
- Once reported, it may take 7 to 10 business days for DTE to service.

notes from the resort district authority

The year 2023, so far, has been a very eventful time for the RDA and its residents, driven by an unexpected source; not from lake flooding but from the sky.

The district experienced an ice storm in February and an EF1 tornado in June causing significant tree damage. The RDA contractor, Davey Tree Service, was engaged and work prioritized to first remove all trees from blocking roads, then removing hanging limbs posing safety hazards and finally removal of tree debris pulled by residents to the edge of the street.

As if this was not enough, Monroe County received a severe rainstorm, and estimated 5-8 inches in less than 12 hours, the night and morning of August 23-24, causing flooding and power outages in the area. The Director inspected the district in the morning and found all the storm water

pumping station auxiliary diesel generators running and no storm water back up anywhere, including Grand Beach, except for the Dewey Station, while sanitary sewers were overflowing, bubbling up through the manholes in Stony Point and State Park subdivisions. The problem with the Dewey Pumping Station was the system tried to start all four pumps simultaneously requiring too much amperage

from the generator. The Drain Commissioner reset the pumps with time delay to stagger pump start up, rectifying the problem and the backedup water was quickly pumped out. This 500-year storm event



demonstrated that the RDA storm water system is functioning at a very high level of efficiency.

A big THANK YOU to all the residents who helped during these trying times and the township board in helping to defray the cost of cleanup which greatly exceeded the budget. Hopefully the remainder of 2023 is less eventful.

As summer moves into autumn, the leaves will begin to explode with bold, beautiful colors while furry and feathered creatures alike are preparing to migrate, store food or just create a cozy place to hibernate. Of course we humans have our own rituals to prepare for the colder months, so as the sweaters and boots emerge from our closets and drawers the Building Department would like to encourage homeowners to make a few safety checks. For example, how's the battery life on your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors? Do you have a chimney in need of cleaning before it's utilized for those cozy, crack-

ling fires, or maybe that furnace could benefit from a yearly checkup? If so, now is a great time to get them scheduled. Remember, permits and inspections are required should it becomes necessary for you to remove and/or replace your existing furnace. Additionally, a contractor must be licensed with the State and registered with the Township to perform the work. Feel free to call us if you want to

verify that your contractor is registered, has pulled a permit, or scheduled the required inspection. Our Inspector will make sure everything is correct and in working order. Once all elements are satisfied and that green approval sticker is placed on the job by one of our licensed inspectors you can complete your payment to the company you have hired. As always, the Building Department is here to help both residents and commercial businesses with any projects and to ensure public safety, health, and welfare, insofar as they are affected by building construction, repair, and maintenance. If you have any questions the direct number to reach us is (734) 242-5900 we are happy to help! For your convenience, fillable printable permit applications are available on our website: https://www. frenchtownmi.gov and you may print them to drop off in person or send them in the mail. There is also a drop box by the front door for after hours but remember, please do not place cash in the drop box and as always, most permits can be issued immediately at the counter. Thank you in advance for your cooperation.

I'm sure you must have noticed all the exciting changes and new businesses here in our Township? Our Building Official, **Gary Dahl** along with our Economic Development / Public Safety Director, **Dave Uhl** has been actively pursuing developers to invest in our community. There are many additional projects in the works that we are not at liberty to discuss just yet, at least not until the final details are worked out so stay tuned for more. In case

you were unaware, the Frenchtown Municipal Building groundbreaking ceremony occurred on September 12th. The construction of this site will allow for many events, activities, and other conveniences to our Residents. If

you have questions or ideas for improvement, we welcome your feedback so please feel free to stop by any time Monday thru Friday between the hours of 8:30am to 4:30pm to let us know how we are doing or how we can help. Attention property owners: the Zoning Ordinance were revised as of June and there have been changes to the procedures, so we are more than happy to as-

Did you know that the little white building next to the current Frenchtown Township Hall once served as the Township Hall? This building later became the Robert A. Vivian Branch Library in 1975. It has also served as a meeting hall for township residents and a voting precinct. The original

building was built in 1910 and the back room, known now as the Children's Room, was added in 1957. There have been several people in charge of the branch over the years. Mrs. Edythe Anne Philippart was the first librarian at the branch. Dawn Shock was the next to run



the branch. Librarian Jane Steed took charge of the three Frenchtown

Area libraries in 1999 and Patt Boitnott became the branch technician around that same time. Patt continued running the R.A. Vivian Branch Library until she retired in December 2018. Diana Martel became the Branch Technician in February of 2019 and after Jane retired in 2021, Ashley Liford became the Community Librarian of

the three Frenchtown Area Libraries.

Greetings from Christina and Lisa, Assessing staff here at Frenchtown! Here are some important dates and facts to remember as the seasons change...

November 1st is the deadline for filing Principal Residence Exemption Affidavit (Form 2368) for exemption from the 18-mill school operating tax for the winter tax levy. It is also the deadline for the initial request for the first year of a Conditional Rescission of Principal Residence.

The December Board of Review will meet in December to correct Qualified Errors, and to consider Appeals re-

lated to the Qualified Agricultural Exemption, Disabled Veterans Exemption, and the Poverty Exemption.

If you have any questions related to Property Assessments, Exemptions, or Property Transfers, we would be happy to assist you (734) 242-8588.

their roofs ripped off or collapsed entirely, due to high wind shears while others experienced overturned homes due to a tornado. There was also widespread flooding, and several vehicle crashes due to limbs and debris. We send our sincere condolences to those who suffered through those dreadful storms with so much property loss.

In conclusion, please be mindful that open burning is only allowed from October 20 to November 30. Be courte-

ous of your neighbors, follow the Township Ordinance #175 and be aware of the weather conditions and wind direction.

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frenchtown water department



The Water Treatment Plant had some masonry tuck joints redone and the outside of the building repainted. We are extremely happy with how the work was completed. You might have noticed our crews around this summer working on clearing, painting, and adding Storz fittings to the hydrants in the Township. We have made a large effort to help assist the Fire Department in making the hydrants easier to locate and quicker to access.

Just as a reminder, we have our online payments system set up at **frenchtown-township.org**. Please make sure you only go to that website to make your payments! We have had customers make payments at other website, but we never received the payments. **Again, please only use our website**.

Frenchtown Charter Township has broken ground on a 25 Acre Municipal Complex on Dixie Hwy adjacent to Detroit Beach. This development project includes a Community Center, a Municipal Building and a new Sheriff's substation

to replace the existing 100-year-old building located near the corner of Nadeau/Dixie.

This new substation will include state-of-the-art equipment and facilities to dramatically improve the overall working conditions for our Frenchtown contracted and County Deputies. Furthermore, Sheriff Troy Goodnough has committed to designating this facility as the new, District 1 Headquarters and

will be relocating an additional 8 County funded Deputies from Monroe Township to Frenchtown Township. Given the outdated and poor condition of the current facility coupled with the Township having the highest call to service volume in Monroe County, the Township Board felt this project was a necessary infrastructure improvement. Additionally, this new location allows increased visibility and accessibility to not only Frenchtown residents but our neighbors north and south that are serviced by the County funded deputies. The Community Center is a 20,000 Square foot event location venue and will seat up to 580
